Finding Jesus in the Old Testament

Scripture

Gen 1:1-2

In the beginning... (hebrew translation - In the first, which could mean Jesus, the first born/link to John 1:1, In the beginning was the word). Then in verse 2 we see that the Spirit of God (known later as the Holy Spirit) was hovering over the waters... So the trinity, was there in the beginning.

Gen 3:15

15

And I will put enmity

between you and the woman,

and between your offspring[a] and hers;

he will crush[b] your head,

and you will strike his heel."

Micah 5:2

"But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah,

though you are small among the clans[a] of Judah,

out of you will come for me

INTRO

It's getting VERY close to Christmas now, and now we have had thanksgiving, we can start to get the Christmas decorations out. I know I have been getting very excited for Christmas this year, and preparing today's discussion topic has helped with that in a very good way, and I hope I can lead us all in this this morning. Next Sunday is the 1st of Advent, and we take a break from our normal series to focus more on advent and Christmas and the birth of Jesus, the one who gives us so much hope. However, today leads perfectly into advent, as we look at Jesus in the OT, and where we can find him there. Now a couple of you might be thinking... Wasn't be born at the start of the NT? How can he then be in the OT? Others of you will be thinking... well He's everywhere, how are we going to fit all of that into and 15 minute intro?

Well if you are thinking the first question... you be thinking exactly what I was thinking for the first year I was a Christian. I just focussed on the NT, thinking the OT was old and irrelevant, and thought it didn't really mean anything for now. This term I think we can agree that the OT has every bit as much to say to us in 2014 as the NT.

Creation

So where is Jesus in the OT? and where do we first see Him? how far back to do we have to go? Exodus? Genesis? The fall? No even further. It was the 6th day, when God had created the earth, and all the animals. All the way back here is where many people have agreed is the first sign of Jesus. Genesis 1.26 says that .

Then God said ' Let us make mankind in our own image, in our likeness...

There was a plural, more than one in that creation. And we are made in their likeness if we want to carry this plural theme on. Now I am not saying that Jesus was actually there with Adam and Eve in the garden as an onlooker, but we can see that he was pre-existent as part of the Holy Trinity. So that is the start, and if we are going get through all the other parts we'll have to move on...

The Fall

But we don't have to go far, only a couple of chapters, because in Chapter 3, we have the fall, and Adam and Eve have eaten the fruit, and God is dealing out his punishments, and the clue is in what he says to the snake.

And I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will crush your head, and you will strike his heal.

So here we see Eve's offspring, mankind, crushing the serpent representing satan, and saying that the day will come when he will be defeated. He will be trodden down like the enemy he is. 'Your head and his heal will meet, and it won't turn out good for you.'

Noah

Then we have whispers of Jesus' story echoing through the stories of Noah and the Ark, Noah being the only one to have relationship with God when the rest of mankind's hearts have turned evil beyond help, and Noah being the one to restore peace, as Jesus was the one to restore peace between God and man when he took His place on the cross.

Abraham

We have Abraham and Isaac, with the only son being made available for sacrifice, and God back in Genesis 22 saying that He will provide the lamb for the offering. Here we also have the fact that Isaac carried his own wood up for the offering as Jesus carried His own cross, and that this possibly according to some historians was the same mountain that Jesus ended up being crucified on. it was a Mountain just outside Jerusalem.

Moses

We have Moses and God at the burning bush, when God identifies himself as I Am! and Jesus identifying himself as I Am in John 8: 58, which we can take as a reminder that He will always be with us. The same God (I Am) that went with Moses to save Israel came to earth as Jesus (I Am) to save the world. One of Jesus' names is Emmanuel, which translates to God with Us.

David

We have more. David, Kind David, writer of Psalms, and one of the great Kings of Israel was born in Bethlehem, where Jesus was also born. David used an unconventional weapon to win a great victory for God, the sling with which he killed Goliath. Jesus also won the victory, over an even greater enemy, using weapons not of this world in dying on the cross. Paul talks of this in 2 Corinthians 10:4.

'The weapons we fight with are not the weapons of the world. On the contrary they have divine power to demolish strongholds.'

(We have to remember there is a different battle that we are fighting that isn't of this world. We need to use unconventional weapons, just like David and Jesus did. This weapon is prayer, and this weapons power comes from our secret weapon; Jesus. ????)

In Psalm 22, we have Messianic psalm, a psalm written by David, that Jesus even calls out on the cross, 'My God, my God why have you forsaken me?' (Matt 27:46), then in verses 6-8 we see a true reflection of the man the world saw Jesus as.

But I am a worm, not a man, scorned by everyone, despised by the people. All who see me mock me; they hurl insults, shaking their heads. 'He trusts in the Lord' they say, 'Let the Lord rescue him. Let him deliver him, since he delights in him.

vs18

They divide my clothes among them and cast lots for my garment. (clear parallel to Matt 27:35)

and then Jesus also cries out the final words of Psalm 22, 'It is Finished'! John 19:30.

And if you read on in Psalm 22, you can see even more parallels to Jesus life and to who he was. maybe that was a sign post that Jesus was giving us all incase by the time He had gotten to the cross we still needed a little more convincing.

Prophesies

In interest of time we will move on to the prophesies, and the discussion questions will have a lot more focus on this area of the OT....

One thing I would like to say about the Messianic prophesies, or the scriptures telling of the Messiah's coming is just how accurate they are. One of the things I will never forget about these prophecies that I learnt in the early years of my Christian life is that on the final day of Jesus' life alone, 36 prophecies of his life were fulfilled, 29 of them He had no control over at all. Like the example of casting lots for his clothes in Psalm 22 we have just read.

So as you split into your discussion groups, we are going to have a small study of these verses, and I have put on to each table copies of some of the Messianic prophesies and for the first question, I want you to look over them and look for all the images and names Jesus is portrayed as and think about the character of the Messiah they were expecting, and see how much Jesus really fits that.
